Short version: 40 years and a few degrees later, I essentially do a glorified version of the same thing I did when I was growing up!

Statement of Interest: Having crossed the big 4-0, I've really thought about the course of my life and my career, and I realize that it really all started on the stream I grew up on. My time living in the northwest as a teenager made me an environmentalist and planted the seed to end up settling here.
